

JUBILEE: NEW BEGINNINGS



READINGS FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

FIRST READING

~ Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10 ~

Ezra the priest brought the law before the assembly, which consisted of men, women, and those children old enough to understand. Standing at one end of the open place that was before the Water Gate, he read out of the book from daybreak till midday, in the presence of the men, the women, and those children old enough to understand; and all the people listened attentively to the book of the law. Ezra the scribe stood on a wooden platform that had been made for the occasion. He opened the scroll so that all people might see it—for he was standing higher up than any of the people—and, as he opened it, all the people rose. Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and all the people, their hands raised high, answered, "Amen, amen!" Then they bowed down and prostrated themselves before the Lord, their faces to the ground. Ezra read plainly from the book of the law of God, interpreting it so that all could understand what was read. Then Nehemiah, that is, His Excellency, and Ezra the priest-scribe and the Levites who were instructing the people said to all the people: "Today is holy to the Lord your God. Do not be sad, and do not weep"—for all the people were weeping as they heard the words of the law. He said further: "Go, eat rich foods and drink sweet drinks, and allot portions to those who had nothing prepared; for today is holy to our Lord. Do not be saddened this day, for rejoicing in the Lord must be your strength!

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

~ Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 15 ~

SECOND READING

~ 1 Corinthians 12:12-30 ~

Brothers and sisters: As a body is one though it has many parts, and all the parts of the body, though many, are one body, so also Christ. For in one Spirit we were all baptized into one body, whether Jews or Greeks, slaves or free persons, and we were all given to drink of one Spirit.

Now the body is not a single part, but many. If a foot should say, "Because I am not a hand I do not belong to the body," it does not for this reason belong less to the body. Or if an ear should say, "Because I am not an eye I do not belong to the body," it does not for this reason belong any less to the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, there are many parts, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I do not need you," nor again the head to the feet, "I do not need you." Indeed, the parts of the body that seem to be weaker are all the more necessary, and those parts of the body that we consider less honorable we surround with greater propriety, whereas our more presentable parts do not need this. But God has so constructed the body as to give greater honor to a part that is without it, so that there may be no division in the body, but that the parts may have the same concern for one another. If one part suffers, all the parts suffer with it; if one part is honored, all the parts share its joy.

Now you are Christ's body, and individually parts of it. Some people God has designated in the church to be, first, apostles; second, prophets; third, teachers; then, mighty deeds; then of healing, assistance, administration, and varieties of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work mighty deeds? Do all have gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret?

GOSPEL

~ Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21 ~

Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those eyewitnesses from the beginning and ministers of the word have handed them down to us, I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received.

Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news of him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all.

He came to Nazareth, where he had grown up, and went according to his custom into the synagogue on the Sabbath day. He stood up to read and was handed a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written: The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,/ because he has anointed me/ to bring glad tidings to the poor./ He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives/ and recovery of sight to the blind,/ to let the oppressed go free,/ and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord./ Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him. He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

LECTIO DIVINA of PRAYER & RESOLUTION

PRAYER: Recall Jesus' words from today's Gospel reading about coming to proclaim liberty to the captives. Prayerfully ask Jesus to show you an area of your life where you are in slavery to sin and in need of the release, healing, and relief from oppression that he offers.
RESOLUTION: Recognizing our spiritual poverty—our complete dependence on God—talk to Jesus about areas where you need to be released and ask him what you can do to seek healing during the week. Ask for his help in this area.

	In the reading from Nehemiah 8, the people began weeping as they heard the Word of God read and explained to them. During prayer, recall a Scripture passage that strikes you with particular force, and reflect on what it means to you.

	Tuesday
,	The reading this week from Nehemiah 8 advises the people not to grieve on hearing the word of God, but to celebrate a holy day, "for rejoicing in the Lord must be your strength." Do you experience joy as a feeling or as a decision? How does it strengthen you?

Wednesday

In this week's Gospel reading, Luke states the reason why he wanted to write an "orderly sequence" for Theophilus (a name that means "friend of God"); namely, "that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received." Ask God to show you how knowing the truth can build your friendship with him.
"For with you is the fountain of life,/ and in your light we see light." —Psalm 36:10
Thursday
The video this week compared the return of the land during the Jubilee year to the promise of Paradise that Jesus offered the "good thief" on the cross. How does that same promise affect the way you approach God?

"And he said to him, 'Truly, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise.""

Jesus' arrival in our midst means that we can be released from the slavery of sin. As you come before him in prayer this week, ask him to reveal to you an area of sin that enslaves you, one from which you have been unable to free yourself. Then write a short prayer for release from that sin.
